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Introduction

This is our third annual report for the period 1 March 2023 - 29 February 2024. When the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent hard lockdown hit South Africa in March 2020, the management of YoungPeople@Work launched a strategy to address the crisis of hunger amplified by the pandemic.

The following strategic intervention was adopted:

Our strategic intervention:

- (a) Start a Food Fund by mobilizing funds to support 20 food relief projects which proliferated in various communities.
- (b) Building partnerships to maximize resource mobilization.
- (c) Help build capacity of the emerging leadership to sustain food relief projects.

This report highlights our activities for the above period.

Please note:

Many FRASA members are still involved in the food relief although the number has been reduced to a lack of access to food resources. Only those linked to our food partners like Food Forward SA, Food on the Table, SA Harvest, Shoprite Food Kitchen, etc. are still able to distribute meals on a consistent basis. An average of 500-1000 meals are distributed per active member with Compassionate Hearts on Touws River distributing the most at over 15 000 meals per month.

Feedback from members

Labeeba Stanley from Scottsdene in Kraaifontein wrote:

"After we received the amount of R92 000 from Agriculture, we still use from that money to buy what we need in our garden. Despite the water issue that we still face, we keep on moving forward and do our best to reach our level. Very soon we will have our own electricity box where we will buy our own electricity for the pump to water the plants. While we are waiting, we prepare all our beds with the compost and eco pallets for our new plants that are busy growing in our Greenhouse. Dept. Agriculture also sent an Assistant Practitioner from Dept. of Agriculture Land Reform and Rural Development. He started working from the 15 May 2023 on his first day where he sends a regular report every week. Our residents also received their chickens those who completed their application forms of Questionnaire Households Profiling Starter Packs provided by Agriculture are for free. We also open a group chat where we share some ideas and pictures to stay connected and sustainable. My mission is to encourage them also with the Word of God and to give their first offering (eggs) to someone in need. Together we fight against hunger. They also sell their eggs to put food on the table for their families. I love what I am doing and feel good to see smiles and happy faces especially in our community where there are no jobs for our people. They also sell their eggs and it makes a big difference in lots of families especially where there is no income.

Because of all the workshops we attend with Frasa and YoungPeople@Work we learned to share with one another especially our FRASA partners. On Thursday we assisted Mrs Zita Petersen Director from Sky's Wooden Spoon with some of our resources like compost, Eco Pallet and seeds for their project. Regards. Labeeba Stanley"

Rashaad Baker from Compassionate Hearts in Touws River wrote:

"Compassionate Hearts Touwsriver food garden was established in May last year. Despite challenges like lack of equipment and seedlings and seed as well as flooding in December we still manage to harvest beetroot, patatoes, cabbage and spinage. Dept of Agriculture has been supportive throughout and they have now approved a budget for us for R108000. This will be utilised to install an irrigation system complete with pump and Jojo tanks. Furthermore they will supply us with seedlings, seed, protective clothing, gumboots and safety shoes as well as garden equipment and compost."

Pastor Raymond Weaver from Children Have A Dream Foundation in Delft wrote:

"Good morning Frank, we did some soil preparation this week and mixed it with compost that were supplied by Soil for Life. We started our 2nd intake of people that showed some interest in the food gardening project and had a short introduction. We will officially start the course 6th September for 3 months hosted and facilitated by CHAD Foundation in partnership with Soil for Life. We're waiting for our seedlings that will arrive sometime in next week to start planting. Silver Sands primary SGB is endorsing our initiative and will contribute financially towards purchasing whatever we need. Thank you once again to FRASA for their invaluable support through this process. Much appreciated and blessings to you Mr Frank."

Lucy Beukes from Building Bigger Tables in Bishop Lavis wrote:

"Department of Agriculture has put up fencing at Helderberg Primary for the back and front garden. They are slowly starting to deliver seedlings, compost, gardening tools etc."

Sibongile Samsam from Uncedolwethu Foundation in Ottery wrote:

"Uncedo Lwethu Foundation planted celery, beetroot and monitoring them very well. It's a season of bugs in the garden. Yet the spring onion comes out beautifully always. Dealing with a small space there's a lot one can accomplish."

Marileze Johannes from San Michell Independent School wrote:

"Our food garden initially thrived and we were fortunate to receive donated seedlings. However, ongoing vandalism caused issues with our water supply after our water pump and JOJO tanks were stolen. Despite these challenges, we were able to successfully harvest two crops. We utilized the produce for our own kitchen needs and also shared it with other NGOs in our vicinity."

Matilda Mzilikazi from Intervisionary wrote:

"This year is a bit tough. We cannot stop growing food as it helps with the ECD and community kitchen. I will share with you recent pics. We still have lots of space that needs seedlings and do not have funding. We have opted to trying to make our own seedlings." (The project was referred to the Department of Agriculture.)

Membership review

A few new members joined FRASA and some were offered bursaries. Some members renewed their membership whilst others made arrangements to pay off their annual membership fees.

Funding and finance

The funding contract from King Baudouin Foundation stopped on 31 May 2023. Our main source of since then was membership fees. We submitted a funding proposal to the Department of Social Development which was acknowledged. Our main expense was mostly for transport towards collecting veggie and bread donations on a weekly basis.

Board developments

Jacoba Hamman from Walk the Talk who fell pregnant, resigned from the board and was replaced with Iris Busakwe from Edyardini. The board met 3 times during this reporting period.

Challenges experienced

With the closure of the Food Fund due to a lack of funding, many members were not able to consistently distribute meals in their community. There were others who forged strong partnerships with various food relief agencies and continued feeding. Some members who operate food gardens also experienced challenges with access to water and vandalism. Others experienced challenges with volunteers not being very reliable.

Conclusion

Our lack of funding and the closure of our Food Fund have caused a temporary disruption in our members' ability to effectively execute their primary mandate which is to distribute food in their respective communities. Our capacity building focus has also been less than effective due to the struggles our members faced for survival. The sharing of resources among members continued however. Some members have also expanded their mandate and started to offer more than just food relief. Two more members are now offering computer literacy classes and four offer music and art classes. Despite our resource challenges, our members are still making a difference in their respective communities and we are hopeful that we will bounce back with new vigour as the crisis of poverty deepens. I want to thank our members, board, donors and strategic partners for their continued support which enabled us to execute our mandate and make a difference in the lives of many.
